

LOVE AND DEVOTION TO GOD



Love and devotion: two very common words in our Christian lexicon, and yet of profound and great importance.

To love God is an act of a person's will, as it hardly comes naturally to a human being. It is a voluntary response to God's love poured into our lives, which is perfect, unconditional, coming from His very nature, because He is in essence LOVE.

I am only making noise, I am nothing, I am of no use, I gain nothing...if LOVE is not present."

When we love God, after arduous and sacrificial service, we should feel like Jacob (Gen. 29:20) who worked seven years for Rachel, but "they seemed to him as a few days because he LOVED her." He joyfully worked seven more years for her!



When we love God, we want everything we do to please Him, to bring Him delight, to bless Him, to glorify Him, and to gladden His heart.

Devotion is the fervor, the reverence, the ardent heart of the disciples who went to Emmaus (Luke 24). Nothing can be better than to be at the side of the Beloved One, than to share every circumstance of life and ministry with Him. Nothing can be better than waiting for His guidance, instruction, and direction for the task at hand. It is to admire Him, to be enraptured, to spend time with Him, and to manifest our love for Him in word and deed.

Love and devotion will be wrapped in praise, adoration, gratitude, and surrender. Servants will be overjoyed at the privilege of being worthy of service, and the heart of the Lord will be filled with joy. We hope this Salat will bless the lives of these servants, and inspire all its readers to deep love and fervent devotion to our Loving God.

...a project should yield more successes


...or that "at least" there should be more visible results... that we should have a more fruitful harvest!

Then the Lord stops me and asks: Are the results YOUR motivation? Is the "progress" or lack of it YOUR concern...or is it YOUR sense of responsibility that feels betrayed, for not reaching "YOUR" expectations of success?

It makes me see...

that... HE called His disciples "to be with Him" (Mk.3:14), that... it is "The Father" who draws them (Jn.6:44), that... He is being the Good Shepherd of "those few sheep" that already follow Him with us, being the One who watches over them when they get entangled in the thickets of the cares of life, when they wander away as they are prone to do, when they quarrel among themselves... and then He reminds me that I myself am one of His sheep... as needy of everything as the others!

He also reminds me that He treasured when the new believer, with conviction, said: 'I play the audio of the Word at a high volume for my daughters because I know it does not return void' ... or when her husband, angry and drunk, comes home, and she prays while placing her hand on him as he sleeps.



... and then? ... How not to surrender in adoration before that God who loves us so intentionally? ... How not to put aside my own limitations and the expectations of the world, to serve Him with devotion? ... How not to live to know Him better and strive to come to love Him as He deserves?

I come now to the "practical point," where it makes perfect sense that Paul prayed," that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, that you...may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God." Ephesians 3:16-19. And you... Why do you do what you do?
